4. Update on the Water Framework Directive and Water Quality in Limerick: (Anne Goggin, Senior Executive Engineer, LCCC)

### Water Quality Report 2018-2019 – Limerick

Anne Goggin played a EPA synopsis of the national state video

In Limerick less than half, i.e. 46% of our surface water bodies have satisfactory water quality. The national figure is 53%

Limerick has seen a 3.8% deterioration since 2015.

Limerick has only one high status water body – i.e. pristine water – The Behanagh near Aherlow.

And one bad water body the Ahavarragh river in Dromcollogher. This is due to sewage discharge.

The main pressures on water quality come from agriculture, hydromorphology (river structure alteration from e.g. arterial drainage, dredging, flood works), urban treatment plants, forestry, domestic septic tanks, peat, industry, mines and quarries.

Limerick City and County Council's Role: Protect & Restore

- Monitoring and Responding to pollution complaints
- Investigations to identify pressures.
- Working with the farming community to minimise impact
- Supporting Maigue Rivers Trust
- Working with LAWPRO in and with communities (CWOs etc)

There were many questions from the councillors about treatment plants. The LCCC director of services said Irish Water does not have sufficient resources to address all plants that are over capacity or not fit for purpose. He asked for help from councillors and other representatives to lobby for more and sufficient resources.

Liz – asked about the treatment plants in Hospital & Knocklong.

The director of service said they do need work but it is not at the top of the priority list for Limerick. Glin and Drumcollogher treatment plants are at the top of the list

5. Notice of Motion submitted by Councillor S. Hartigan (Referred from the Full Council Meeting held on Thursday 3 December, 2020)

Referred from the Full council meeting Thur 3<sup>rd</sup> Dec 2020.

I will move at the next Meeting that Limerick City and County Council assess the possibility of providing a roadside tree maintenance grant scheme. This scheme would provide some financial assistance to communities and groups that undertake roadside tree maintenance and the cutting of overhanging trees to assist landowners in complying with their responsibilities under Section 70 of the Roads Act, 1993.

Cllr Hartigan was looking for a solution to stop mature trees been felled but still give landowners and
